Annual Chapter Picnic

The Preserve is located on the northern border of San Joaquin County. It is on the west side of Lower Sacramento Rd., just south of Dry Creek and the city of Galt.

It consists of approximately 80 acres, a large portion of which is riparian habitat lying to the south side of Dry Creek. There is also a seasonal creek and pond on the property.

We will start off birding at 8:00 a.m. and then hold a short Annual Business Meeting followed by our picnic lunch.

In the interest of public health, this will not be a potluck picnic, as it has been in years past. We request that each of you bring your own food. If you decide to bring something to share anyway, please make sure it is individually wrapped.

We will provide tables and a few shade structures, but please bring your own chairs so you will have somewhere to sit while eating and listening to the Board meeting.

FRIDAY, May 20- Louis Park, including Pixie Woods

Join Donna Marciano at Louis Park for a morning of birding. We will meet at the boat launch parking lot at 8;00 a.m., and bird throughout the park, including Pixie Woods. Some of the bird species we should see include: Yellow-billed Magpie, Wood Duck, Acorn & Nuttall's woodpeckers, Swallow spp., perhaps an Osprey on the water channel, and White-tailed Kites, which have nested here in the past. This trip is open to birders of all skill levels, from beginner to advanced. This will be an easy walk under the shade of trees, and most of the walk is wheelchair accessible. This trip will last 3 hours or so. Bring a snack, water, and a hat.

Our Annual Summer Butterfly Count & Audubon Field Trip

This field trip is cosponsored by San Joaquin Audubon, San Joaquin County, University of California Cooperative Extension and the North American Butterfly Association. San Joaquin Audubon joined in 1986, so this will be our 36th year of participation.

This trip is a delightful day of finding and counting butterflies. No experience is needed and we will give you a field guide for your participation. The count area includes Oak Grove Regional Park, Woodbridge Regional Park, Lodi Lake Wilderness Area and White Slough. (So we see many birds and other wildlife in the process of counting butterflies.)

You will need to bring lunch, water, a hat and sunscreen. Bring net, binoculars and field guides if you have them. We will meet up and carpool at Oak Grove Nature Center at 8:00 a.m. We should be back at Oak Grove between 3:00 and 4:00 p.m., depending on the weather.

The Summit was a day filled with workshops, activities, and networking opportunities to promote Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) activities for children!

On Saturday, April 23, 2022, San Joaquin & Sacramento Audubon Societies partnered with the Girl Scouts "Heart of Central California" Council in the annual Outdoor Adventure Campout on the shores of Lake Camanche. SATURDAY, June 4— Introductory Birding Field Trip

Join leader Pat Paternostro for the monthly River Walk bird count. This month, we'll start at the Visitor Center parking lot at 6:30 a.m. Snack, water, and bug spray are all recommended. We should finish by noon.

SATURDAY, June 18— Woodbridge Wilderness

Join leaders Kathy and Virginia Bonham for our monthly census of this small riparian park on the banks of the Mokelumne River. Meet at the north end of Meadowlark Lane in Woodbridge at 8:00 a.m.

SATURDAY, June 25— Mokelumne River Fish Hatchery

Join leaders Liz West and Joanne Katanic for our monthly census of this lovely little riparian area below Camanche Dam. Meet Liz and Joanne in the fish hatchery parking lot at 8:00 a.m.

SUNDAY, June 26— Indian Grinding Rock State Park

Meet Donna Marciano in the parking lot (14881 Pine Grove-Volcano Rd, Pine Grove) at 8:00 a.m. for a day of birding at this wonderful small State Park. The birdlife varies depending on the season, but many species are seen year-round, including Turkey Vultures, Scrub and Steller's Jays, California Quail, Acorn and Hairy Woodpeckers, Northern Flickers, Hermit Thrushes, and Wild Turkeys (non-native). In early summer, there will be the bright colors of the Western Tanager, Bullock's Oriole, Black-headed and Evening Grosbeaks, Western Bluebirds, and Anna's Hummingbirds can be seen in the woods around the meadow. A bird list is available at the museum. Trip goes till 2:00 p.m. or so. Bring water, hat, and lunch for a picnic after the trip, tables are available. Some light to moderate walking. This trip is open to all, beginners and experienced birders alike. Part of the bird walk is wheelchair accessible, the other half is on dirt path. There is a parking fee which also covers entrance into the museum, which is definitively worth a trip inside.

A Couple of nice birds from the April Monthly Bird Census at the Mokelumne River Day Use Area

Birders were treated to a couple of nice birds at our most recent bird count along the Mokelumne River below Camanche Dam. Lewis's Woodpeckers have been seen here regularly this winter and spring. They may even be breeding. The White-throated Sparrow was first heard singing by sharp-eared Jim Rowoth, and came out into the open to playback of its song, to the delight of the group. February 24, 2022 - April 21, 2022 (All sightings pertain to San Joaquin County) Submitted by Liz West

Jim Rowoth photographed an American X Eurasian Wigeon hybrid on Empire Tract February 28th.

On March 26th, Rosemarie Richardson picked out a **Pacific Golden Plover** among five hundred or so Black-bellied Plovers at the Lodi Sewage Ponds.

Philip Fiorio photographed a male **Calliope Hummingbird**, April 11th at Jacob Meyers Recreation Area. On April 18th, Pat and Dave Croft reported a **Calliope Hummingbird** at the Heritage Oak Winery Feeder.

While doing a Tri-colored Blackbird survey at Hwy 12 pond near Hwy 88, Kasey Foley and Rich Peterson found a Solitary Sandpiper.

The **Lewis' Woodpecker** irruption continues in the county. Good numbers are still being seen at Mokelumne Day Use Area and several were at Carnegie State Vehicle recreation area near Corral Hollow Rd.
