TUESDAY, February 11 Tim D. Manolis *"Field Guide to the Spiders of California and the Pacific Coast States"*

Tim Manolis is the illustrator of the brand new book *Field Guide to the Spiders of California and the Pacific Coast States.* Tim will be talking about spider biology and the types of spiders that occur in California. We will learn about some of the common spiders likely to be seen in Central Valley homes and yards, and, finally, focus primarily on jumping spiders.

Tim Manolis is an artist, illustrator, and biological consultant. From 1986 to 1990, he was the editor and art director of the magazine *Mainstream*. His papers on birds and his bird illustrations have appeared in many journals and magazines. He is the author of *Dragonflies and Damselflies* and illustrator of *Butterflies of the San Francisco Bay and Sacramento Valley Regions*.

Lyman Belding (1829-1917)

Lyman Belding could be considered one of the first birders from this area as he lived in Stockton for 30 years. He has rightly been described as a "bird collector," as that is what he did both in California and Lower California in the 1870's an 1880's. Quite a few early ornithologists made at least a part of their monies by collecting bird eggs, the skins of birds, or both which they sold to museums, research institutions or collectors. Even John J. Audubon was a collector in that he shot birds so that he could have them "in hand" to paint. The father of Bernd Heinrich, the ornithologist who wrote the excellent "Ravens in Winter", was one of the last full time collectors. He went all over the world to collect and sell specimens.

In 1879 Belding wrote "A Partial List of the Birds of Central California" which was published in the Proceedings of the United States National Museum (the Smithsonian) and edited by ornithologist Robert Ridgeway. Ridgeway was the curator of birds at the Smithsonian who added some editor's remarks including one that Mr. Belding had correctly identified all 600 specimens submitted. Belding also wrote at least 5 papers about his collecting in Lower California. He must have had quite a "life list".

Belding made lists of several areas where he observed and collected. He submitted lists from Marysville, Stockton, Murphys, and Calaveras Big Trees. He described Stockton as being on the eastern margin of a vast tule swamp. The plains to the east of Stockton and around Marysville were sometimes cultivated or had short grass except along the watercourses where there were oaks, willows, poplars, grapevines, briers, weeds and grass. Murphys is described as being at the juncture of the chaparral and the pine belt, and Calaveras Big Trees as being in the coniferous forest.

He lists 108 species observed at various times in the vicinity of Murphys. From August 27 to September 5, 1878, he observed 42 species in the vicinity of Murphys, with many of the summer residents gone. 66 species were seen at Big Trees from July 4 to August 27, 1878. He added a few more species from Moran's and Dunbar's meadows 2 or 3 miles west of Big Trees. This was followed by detailed discussions of the various species including where and when they occurred. For instance, the Varied Thrush arrives in Stockton about the middle of November and leaves in March or April. It takes a bit of careful reading as some of both the common names and scientific binomials have changed. I may write another article once I sort these all out.

There are at least 5 subspecies which have been named after Belding, three of these by Robert Ridgeway of the Smithsonian. He was thus honored because he collected the early specimens. Probably the most famous California bird among these is Belding's Savannah Sparrow which is a south coast salt marsh specialist. A recent paper has been done on the "Reproductive Success of Belding's Savannah Sparrows in a Highly Fragmented Landscape," by Abby N. Powell and C.L. Collier. I do not know if Belding's Ground Squirrel of the high Sierra was named after Lyman Belding but it was named by C.Hart Marrion in 1888 and Lyman collected in the area where they are found. Let me know if you find any more information about Lyman.

BIRD SIGHTINGS

October 17, 2013 - December 9, 2013 (All sightings pertain to San Joaquin County) Submitted by Liz West

On October 19th, Bruce Cousens determined that a large **Tree Swallow** roost was occurring in southern San Joaquin County. The last time this happened in the county was in October 2005. Jim Rowoth, David Coursey and Elionora Bjur went out and found two separate roosts, one located on Linne Rd., near Tracy. Numbers were estimated at 100,000 swallows and continued through at least October 27th.

Cliff Hawley found a Thick-billed Fox Sparrow at Heritage Oaks Winery on October 24th.

Mathew Dodder saw two White-throated Sparrows at Mokelumne Day Use Area on November 29th.

On November 28th and 29th, David Yee photographed a dark-lored White-crowned Sparrow in his backyard in north Lodi. It is possibly of an eastern race, rather than Gambel's.
