The cuckoo is an accomplished parasite that tricks other birds into rearing its young. The host gain no benefit because the hatchling ejects their eggs from the nest. Both species engage in an evolutionary arms race—the host attempting to thwart predation, the cuckoo developing subtle subterfuge.

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RETRAINING CRANES

Ohio researchers are attaching crane beaks to their hands and marching around swamps in Michigan. This in an attempt to show how sandhill cranes born in captivity can be encouraged to join a migratory flock of cranes that regularly stop at a Michigan refuge. These test techniques are designed to help the endangered whooping crane, but are being tried

out on the more common sandhills. So far the techniques has worked. The only preservation project for the whoopers is in Kessimmee Prairie in central Florida where biologists are introducing captive-borne cranes into a migratory flock.

DAK GROVE PARK COMMITTEE


