"The Tail Tells"

"The male Anna's hummingbird emits an emphatic squeak as he swoops above his intended mates, but it's his tail, not his voice, that makes the sound. A study published online January 29th in the 'Proceedings of the Royal Society B' settles a 68 year old debate about the source of the chirp.

Ornithologist Christopher Clark of the University of California, Berkeley, suspected that the sound had something to do with the birds' unusually shaped outer tail feathers. So his team took high-speed videos of the birds doing dive displays in a California park. The videos revealed that a quick tail flick coincided with the squeak, and the displays of four consistent chirpers were silenced when researchers trimmed their tails.

In the lab, the researchers found that isolated feathers produced a continuous whine when subjected to an air stream. They fluttered like little flags, generating the same frequently regardless of wind speed. 'We were blown away,' Clark says, when they realized that the feathers worked like musical reeds, a mechanism previously unknown in birds.

The study 'fully solves' the question of the Anna's chirp and is likely to explain other non-vocal bird sounds as well, says biomechanist Douglas Altshuler. (Science, Vol 319 8 pg 705. February 2008.)

Lark Bunting Plumage Variation and Sexual Selection

In Lark Buntings the females are brown with dull white wing patches. The male is mostly black but has patches of brown feathers of different sizes in different places as well a very obvious white wing patches with also very in size and color.

The theory of the evolution of ornamental male trails as a result of sexual selection assumes consistency in selection through time. It has not been known the degree to which individual female preferences are flexible. This study showed that sexual selection of male traits varied dramatically through the years. Individual females were fickle in their mate choice, changes in the choices and in mating patterns through time may "weaken the strength of sexual selection and could maintain genetic variation underlying multiple sexual ornaments."



WALDO HOLT HABITAT FUND

A group of people got together last year with Waldo to discuss the possibility of purchasing some property on his behalf to attempt to memorialize what Waldo helped create in this county; protection of habitat for wildlife, threatened, endangered, or otherwise.

Members of this group have been meeting since then to discuss the options available within San Joaquin County and think they have found one.

There is property along the Mokelumne River, immediately adjacent to the Woodbridge Wilderness Area (previously known as Woodbridge Regional Park) that may be available to purchase in the future. This property is a beautiful riparian area with a large grove of mature Valley Oaks mixed with Live Oaks providing a lot of habitat for birds, mammals, reptiles, and insects.

If you are one of those about to receive that tax rebate and didn't know what to do with it this would be a great way to spend it and help this dream be realized.
