Karrie Reid, Susan Schneider, James Rexroth "The Eco-friendly Yard: Easy Ways to Save Water, Welcome Birds, and Help the Planet"

Incorporating eco-friendly native and Mediterranean-region plants into our gardens can save water, bring beauty, and benefit local birds, butterflies, and beneficial bugs- and it doesn't have to be difficult or expensive.

In this workshop-style format, the panel of three will run through how-to's, sharing failures as well as successes. (We've all had our share of both.) We'll allow ample time for audience examples as well as questions. Let's start a local movement! Limited amounts of free wildflower seeds will be available.

Karrie Reid is the UC Cooperative Extension Environmental Horticulture Advisor for San Joaquin County. She holds an M.S. in Horticulture from UC Davis and is (as you'd expect) an avid gardener.

Susan Schneider, current SJAS President, and James Rexroth, board member, will share the ups and downs of years of experience developing their own native/waterwise yards in Stockton.

SUNDAY, April 29 — University of the Pacific Native Plant Gardens

Join leaders Amy and Doug Weiser as they explore the Bon Appetit Native Plant Garden, established on the Stockton campus in 2015. Seventy varieties of California native plants were selected by Pacific faculty members in the Biological Sciences department, such as Sticky Monkey Flower, Coyote Brush, and several varieties of Manzanita. The garden is enhanced by several specimen boulders carefully selected by faculty of the Geological and Environmental Sciences department, such as Sierra Granite, Rhyolite, Basalt, Blue Schist, Andesite, and Flat Lava. Meet the leaders at 8:00 a.m. in the parking lot by the Burns Tower for an hour of birding, or at 9:00 a.m. at the Native Plant Garden, which is embedded with the Abigail Robb Plaza located adjacent to the Robb Garden on University of the Pacific Stockton's south campus.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

OK, it may be trite to admit this, but Spring is my favorite time of year. I know I'm not alone in appreciating the palette of new greens, the flowers, and the return of migrant and summering birds and butterflies. Above all for me is the splendor of birdsong everywhere. Moving here from Florida 9 years ago, I enjoyed the challenge of learning many new melodies. (OK, there were a few frustrations along the way – as with the endlessly variable Spotted Towhees and Bewick's Wrens.) Now I'm trying to work more on my wildflower identification skills. I just tracked down a copy of Blackwell's *Wildflowers of the Sierra Nevada and the Central Valley*, and I wish I'd discovered it years ago. Relatedly, our chapter will be offering a tour of the University of the Pacific native plant gardens on April 29 (see the description under Field Trips).

What a pleasant diversion from the work I've been focused on for several years now: fighting climate change. National Audubon has studied the anticipated effects on our birds, and is running several climate initiatives. Local chapters have been helping out with their own efforts. At Stockton's Earth Day celebration on April 22, Audubon will set up its usual table, and I hope you'll stop by and see what we have to offer. But I'll also be helping to staff the table of the new San Joaquin County Climate Action Coalition, for which our Audubon chapter is one of a number of founding organizations. We're already working on a vehicle idling campaign, with a tree planting initiative also planned. What better way to celebrate spring than by doing what we can to ensure it stays beautiful for generations to come.

BIRD SIGHTINGS

December 16, 2017 - February 18, 2018 (All sightings pertain to San Joaquin County)

Xavier Sandoval showed Sal Salerno an out of season Wilson's Warbler at Caswell State Park, December 17th.

Ian Souza-Cole found a **Brant** in among some Cackling Geese in newly flooded cornfield on Staten Island, December 19th.

On January 11th, Terry Ronneberg saw the **Lesser Black-backed Gull** David Yee found at the Koster Road quarry pond on November 25th.

There have been **Blue-winged Teal** reported in a couple of different places. Lucas Stephenson and Douglas Hall saw two pair off Woodbridge Rd. January 14th. On January 27th, Dave Fries saw a male on Staten Island. He also saw a **Eurasian Wigeon** the same day on Staten Island.

Sal Salerno found a pair of **Cassin's Finches** at Caswell State Park on January 26th. Sal was not able to relocate them.

On February 2nd, Kurt Mize found a **Swamp Sparrow** along Bear Creek/Pixley Creek bike trail. It was not seen after the second.

On February 18th, David Yee found a very good candidate for an adult **Slaty-backed Gull** at the Koster Rd gravel pit area in the south county near the STA border. The bird was initially observed sitting in the field just east of the canal with thousands of gulls. It then flew to the gravel pit pond, but wasn't refound. There also was a first cycle **Glaucous Gull** present (probably the same bird that's been present since Dec).

Ian Souza-Cole has changed his identification of Red-necked Grebe found in Mokelumne River along Staten Island on November 28th to **Horned Grebe**.
