TUESDAY, November 9 Robert Meese "Status of Tricolored Blackbirds"

Please join Robert and San Joaquin Audubon for this month's program on the status of the Tricolored Blackbird. Robert will give a multimedia presentation on recent trends, Tricolor abundance and productivity, emerging threats, conservation actions, and prospects for the future. He will also review and interpret the results of four years of banding tricolors.

Bob has been with the Information Center for the Environment, ICE, in the Department of Environmental Science & Policy at U.C. Davis for nearly 20 years. He's been working with tricolored blackbirds for six years and banding tricolors for four years and serves as the scientific lead for the volunteer Tricolored Blackbird Working Group. His work with tricolors has taken him from San Diego County to Butte County with a focus on the Central Valley from Kern County to Glenn County. Bob conducts annual surveys for tricolors to help to locate at-risk colonies located in ephemeral habitats, principally farmer's grain fields, and assists in efforts to conserve these colonies, monitoring those that are saved and estimating their productivity.

TUESDAY, December 14 David Yee "Christmas Bird Count Refresher"

Everyone is encouraged to attend this annual refresher by David Yee which will help us all prepare for the upcoming Stockton (December 19, 2010) and Wallace-Bellota (January 2, 2011) Christmas Bird Counts. Lodi Sandhill Crane Festival

Mark your calendars for the 14th annual Lodi Sandhill Crane Festival, to be held Nov. 5-7, 2010, at Hutchins Street Square, in Lodi. The festival kicks off Nov. 5 with a wine & hors d'oeuvres reception from 6:00-8:30 p.m. sponsored by the wineries of Woodbridge Uncorked that opens the festival and art show.

This year's festival features family activities, an art show, workshops, wildlife demos, and nature tours. MORRO BAY WINTER BIRD FESTIVAL

The 15th Annual Morro Bay Winter Bird Festival will be held January 14-17, 2011. Over 110 individual events are featured, including pelagic cruises, boat rides and kayaking in the Bay, van trips throughout the county, as well as many informative workshops.

The Morro Bay Winter Bird Festival is sponsored by the Morro Coast Audubon Society and gives you the chance to join local and national birding experts on a variety of field trips and workshops. Field trip group sizes are limited to maximize spotting and identification opportunities. The Festival also offers workshops aimed at sharpening your birding skills, as well as evening programs with outstanding speakers.

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THE ARNOLD RIM TRAIL

The Arnold Rim trail is a "work in progress" in the Stanislaus National Forest near the towns of Arnold and Avery at about 4,000' elevation. Some folks who didn't want to see their motorized access to trails and logging roads restricted were not happy when this trail was proposed. Some still aren't happy, but trail construction has begun. More will be finished when grants are obtained. The trail is open to hiking, bicycling, and horseback riding, but not to motorized vehicles. At present it stretches from White Pines, near Arnold, some 10.5 miles to the Avery–Sheep Ranch Road near Avery. This amounts to less than half of the eventual total trail length which will also include a section in Calaveras Big Trees State Park. There is one intermediate access point shown on the map.

It is best to visit the Stanislaus National Forest Ranger Station at Hathaway Pines on Highway 4 to obtain a map and trail information. The station is open weekdays. The trail surface can be muddy after rain and snow. The Arnold Rim Trail Association is a group of volunteers who are helping to finish the trail. They have an informative website at: http://arnoldrimtrail.org.

The developed portions of the trail are located in Stanislaus National Forest in the San Antonio Creek Drainage. San Antonio Creek is one of the upper branches of the Calaveras River. White Pines Lake and Community Park as well as San Antonio Creek Falls are on this creek west of the lake. The Lake was once the log pond for the lumber mill here and White Pines was a "company" lumber town. The trail starts at the Logging Museum near the lake and passes through a second growth mixed conifer forest which has some snowfall each winter. There are trout in the creek and lake, as well as deer, bear, and other wildlife in the forest. Both Osprey and Bald Eagles have been seen at the lake. Ducks and other water birds are often present.

Restrooms, a picnic area, children's playground, fishing and swimming are found at the Lake at what is presently the eastern terminus of the trail. A grant has been obtained to connect the trail to the town of Arnold. There are no fees at this park. This area is about half an hour east of Angles Camp on state highway 4. A group of community volunteers care for the park. White Pines Lake is about a mile north of "downtown" Arnold. Turn left just beyond the Chevron station.

On September 23rd Terry Ronneburg saw a **Western Gull** resting with the Ring-billed and California Gulls at the Tracy Wastewater plant ponds.
