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GREAT GRAY OWLS OF YOSEMITE

SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS

This is a gentle reminder to the birding community that it is against Yosemite National Park policy to post locations of Great Gray Owls in Yosemite on the internet.

Great Gray Owls in California are endangered and very rare. They are particularly vulnerable to disturbance when they are pursued, usually by birders and photographers. As the Yosemite Ornithologist and Lead Great Gray Owl Researcher, we ask that you help us to protect this amazing bird by respecting and enjoying it from afar. On our park website http://www.nps.gov/yose/naturescience/birding-tips.htmwe lists ways to avoid negative impacts to special status species. These include: not using broadcasts to elicit responses (including apps on smart phones), not divulging locations – particularly over the internet, and not using flashlights or spotlights on animals after dusk and before dawn.

That being said, if you wish to experience the Great Gray Owl in a respectful manner, we would recommend visiting a mid-elevation (4,000-7,000) meadow that is lined with several large mature conifers, situating yourself with a view along the meadow edge to both sides, and sitting as quietly as possible on the meadow edge in a concealed location (e.g., under a draping branch) during dusk. Watch for movements along the meadow edges. When owls hunt, they will often perch at the meadow edge, look and listen for their prey (voles and gophers) in the meadow, then swoop down on their prey. If you are quiet and still enough, you may be rewarded with a view of the Great Gray Owl displaying its natural behavior, and have the satisfaction that you are minimizing disturbance to it.

We realize that the vast majority of birders mean no harm, but it's particularly important to be respectful of one of the rarest birds in the state of California. There are only an estimated 200 individuals in the entire state of California. A recent genetic study found the "effective population size" to be 14 individuals, meaning that either there are very few breeding individuals and/or there has been a dramatic reduction in genetic diversity resulting from recent population bottlenecks (Hull et al. 2010). BIRD SIGHTINGS

August 17, 2012 - October 16, 2012 (All sightings pertain to San Joaquin County) Submitted by Liz West

Liz West found a **Solitary Sandpiper** at the Lodi Sewage ponds August 30th. It was walking around the edges of the mud and weeds.

The San Joaquin Audubon field trip led by Jim Rowoth saw 2 **Red-breasted Sapsuckers** at Stockton Rural Cemetery on September 23rd. The first of an irruption, the SJ Audubon field trip to Stockton Rural Cemetery saw more **Red-breasted Nuthatches** than White-breasted on October 14th. Sal Salerno found one October 3rd at Caswell State Park. There were also a half dozen at Delta College.

On October 13th, Joanne Katanic found a **Red-naped Sapsucker** in the elm tree in her front yard. It continues to be seen.

Correction: The **Tri-colored Heron** seen July 9th should have been designated as a possible sighting, since no one was able to find it again.
