#### TUESDAY, November 14 Christy Sherr *"The Surprising Benefits of Beetles and Wildfires"*

Mixed intensity fires and native beetles create some of the most productive and critical habitats for California birds and wildlife. Large, dense patches of standing dead trees are preferred by a host of plants, insects, mammals, and birds such as Black-backed Woodpeckers. Surprisingly, that includes even many of our most threatened and endangered species such as Spotted Owls and Pacific Fishers. Come explore the unique beauty of this extremely important habitat and find out why so many wildlife species benefit from conditions created by beetles and fire.

Christy Sherr is a retired National and State Park Ranger, currently working as a field biologist and Education Coordinator for the John Muir Project of the Earth Island Institute. She is a past president of the Sierra Foothills Audubon Chapter.

#### TUESDAY, December 12 David Yee *"Christmas Bird Count Extravaganza"*

Registration is now open for the 21st annual Central Valley Birding Symposium Nov. 16–19, 2017, at the Stockton Hilton Hotel in Stockton, CA. Judged by many as one of the premier birding events in the West, the CVBS is hosted by the Central Valley Bird Club. Please join us as the CVBS again celebrates the best of birding in the Central Valley! Come meet the board and staff members! Reconnect with old friends and meet new ones!

The CVBS kicks off with a scrumptious hors d'oeuvres buffet & no host bar on Thursday night, followed by one of our favorite keynotes, outstanding photographer and presenter, Ed Harper, with his program on *"Wings over the Central Valley".* 

Friday night's keynote program "*Bank Swallow Colonies on the Upper Sacramento River*" will be presented by Dawn Garcia, a member of the Bank Swallow Technical Advisory Committee. Dawn will give us the scoop on the "little dirt bird" and the dynamic river processes it needs.

Saturday night's keynote program, *"Birding Without Borders: An Epic World Big Year"* will be presented by Noah Strycker. This humorous and inspiring presentation about Strycker's epic World Big Year, in which he set a world record by seeing 6,042 birds in one calendar year, will give you a real appreciation for the birds and birders of the world. Educational and entertaining workshops include: "*Wintering Burrowing Owls in California*" with Lynne Trulio, *"The Surprising Benefits of Beetles and Fire–Wildlife Nurseries*" with Christy Sherr, *"Neotropical Migrants*" with Joe Morlan, "*Winter Waterfowl in the Central Valley*" by Jon Dunn, and an update on Central Valley bird conservation and research programs. Build your skills at workshops: Image Editing (Bob Steele), Bird Sketching (Keith Hansen), Beginning Birding (Sal Salerno) and Carving (Jim Burcio).

Field trips, offered Friday, Saturday and Sunday, always turn up exciting birds. ## SJ Audubon Field Trip Report – Bear Creek Bike Trail, Oct. 1

At Faklis Park/Bear Creek this morning, 12 birders tackling cap-tossing breezes were rewarded with a real spectacle: well over 1000 Greater White-fronted Geese in a series of skeins, often close enough overhead for us to enjoy all the field marks. Calling out too. Most of these birds were flying north, perhaps to the Woodbridge Rd/Staten Island wintering grounds? We enjoyed Sandhill Cranes overhead as well, plus Red-tailed & Red-shouldered Hawks and a Kestrel. Four Northern Flickers also flew right overhead, one right after the other, showing off their reddish wings. Kingfishers, four species of warblers, a heard-only Virginia Rail, and Golden- and White-crowned Sparrows round out the highlights. As is usually the case here, Wrentits sang from across the slough, unseen but appreciated. Three species of Wrens weren't as cooperative as they sometimes are.

One participant got to see a couple of River Otters; this is a great location for them.

Thanks to everyone for contributing to a real migration liftoff. I will be dreaming of geese.
