During the first week in August Steve Stocking and Rich Boubelik observed a Pine Martin being mobbed by Juncos at Fourth Recess Lake (10,400), some Dusky Grouse at Lower Mills Cr. Lake (II,000), many Water Pipets and Rosy Finch at Lake Italy (11,200), and several Townsends Solitares below Lower Pine Cr.Lake. We were surprised to see very few robins and Wh-crowned sparrows which are usually common in the high Sierra.

8-7 Dave Wagner saw a Pileated woodpecker at Big Trees S.P. 8-9 John Blades observed a Coopers hawk at C. M. Church. Then on 8-16 John Blades saw both Band-tailed Pigeon & Red-br Sapsucker at Arnold. On 8-17 Dave W. noted a Wh-tailed ptarmigan at Upper Grant Lake in Yosemite! On that same day, back here in Stockton Nancy Greenwood ob a Bl-headed grosbeak. 8-18 Waldo Holt observed both a Whimbrel and some Y-headed blackbirds on Medford Island. 8-20 Dennis Smith ob 2 Kingfishers in west Stockton. and on 8-23 1994 David Yee, the holder of the San Joaquin County record of 299 species, observed Virginia's Warbler at Lodi Lake Park!

#### WHITE SLOUGH FIELD TRIP REPORT:

As I left the office and walked into 100 degree heat the afternoon of July 26, I had second thoughts about the evening bird stroll I had planned to lead for that day. Many had already assured me of their plans to attend, but I wondered just how many would really show up. Our meeting time at Burns Tower, 6:15, came and went, and not a birder in sight. I left UOP alone at 6:20, en route to White Slough itself, our second designated meeting site.

As I turned down the dusty road to White Slough about 6:40, ten minutes late, it soon became clear that no one else was there. After a few minutes, I decided to pack it in and turned homeword. Suddenly, a cloud of dust in the distance, and Dennis S. appeared, rearing to go, so I turned back so that at least we two could check things out. Just as we started in, Rich H., Yayoi S. and June N. drove up. From one, to two, and now up to four! And quicker than a towhee diving for cover, Foley & Peterson Inc. assived. Our birding posse was now complete. Over the next two hours, we went from afternoon skies to brilliant sunset, to darkness. Hardly any bugs, and wonderful delta breezes. We were all delighted at how delicious an evening it turned out to be. We ended up with nearly 30 species. The hands-down highlight was the low-flying flock of about 20 white-faced ibises (yes John, ibises) that flew right over us. Other treats included N. orioles, W. tanagers, BI-tailed kites, N. harriers, and B. kingfishers. We startled several Green herons as we ambled along, as well as a pair of roosting Turkey vultures and a Red-shouldered hawk. The waning afternoon light gave us great views of a pair of Blue grosbeaks, and we were serenaded by several C. yellowthroats and Rufous-sided towhees. Other interesting finds were a Velvet ant, a muskrat, and a fortunately mellow skunk. And finally, as the sun disappeared, we had just enough light to detect a pair of Barn owls foraging on the opposite shore. Our "birders' night out" turned out to be an unqualified success, worthy of trying again in the future! (Jim Rowoth)

#### ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT

Some changes have now been agreed to in the State of California Endangered Species Act. We regret that some proposed changes which would have strengthened the Act, recovery and habitat plans, remain to be acted on next year since they would have been expensive. No major "gutting" took place and the misinformed retoric regarding Kangaroo Rats and Fairy Shrimp only resulted in public confusion. 1994 is also a critical year form the federal Endangered Species Act. There is a very real threat of weakening the Act in 1994. Representative Pombo needs to be reminded that some of his constituents favor strong protection for endangered species. Senators Feinstein and Boxer need to hear of your support for a strong, effective Endangered Species Act. S 921 (Baucus/Chafee) needs to be strengthened and HR 2043 (Studds)needs more support. IT IS TIME TO LET THEM KNOW OF YOUR SUPPORT.



### CALIFORNIA CONFERENCE ON ECOSYSTEM MANAGEMENT COMING IN OCTOBER

University Extension, UC Davis, offers The California Conference on Ecosystem Management: Designing with Nature, Tuesday-Thursday, Oct. 25-27.
