ATTENTION TAXPAYERS! RARE & ENDANGERED SPECIES INCOME TAX CHECKOFF

Stockton Audubon endorses the endangered species tax checkoff, an opportunity to put part of your tax refund to work to purchase critical habitats for a number of endangered species, enhance and protect other habitats, and encourage more giving.

Just look for the endangered species line (line 90) on your California income tax return and fill in an even dollar amount. If you have a refund coming, the state will deduct the amount you specify and send it to the Department of Fish & Game. IF you owe state tax you simply add the amount to your total due. This amount you give this year is deductible on your 1986 federal income tax return.

Among the habitats to be purchased are properties that support peregrine falcon, California Condor, the San Joaquin Kit Fox and others.

Happy 1985! In 1984 we had many successful programs, field trips, and projects; 1985 should hold as much and more. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you for your help and support in all of our endeavors. Each of you is what makes our group so effective. I hope you will all feel free to let me know any time you have any suggestions for changes in our activities.

As you may have read, the San Joaquin Board of Supervisors did approve amending the general plan so that Carnegie New Town can be developed at Corral Hollow. However, they did not approve cancellation of the Williamson Act Contracts which cover about 80% of the land in the designated area. This delays development of those lands for 10 years. We hope the ten year wait will kill the current plan for development. In any case we will continue to watch what happens there and we will continue to lobby on behalf of the San Joaquin Kit Fox and the other rare and endangered species of the area.


