### OAK GROVE NEWS

A big THANK YOU to all who helped with the summer watering this year at the Oak Grove. With all your help, and without very many meadow voles this year, most of the young native shrubs which were planted in the past few years survived the hot summer. In a few more years, as their root systems go deeper, we won't need to worry about summer watering. We were pleased to see that a few of the young oak trees which were located and staked last spring, and watered all summer, appear to have survived.

The Verna Johnston Bird Oasis (watering pond for birds along the Yokuts Trail) was vandalized during the summer. However, the parks maintenance crew has replaced the water valve and once the new pump gets put in (some time this winter) the Bird Oasis should work as it was designed to, with continuously fresh water for the birds.

This is a good time of year to bird at the Oak Grove, no leaves to hide the little peeps from view. See you there.

CARNEGIE NEW TOWN SCHEDULED FOR HEARINGS

The New Town of Carnegie, a proposed 6,000 acre 35,000 resident community planned for the foothills near Tracy, and opposed by the Farm Bureau, Cattlemens' Association, Woolgrowers and Sierra Club last year, is again before the Board of Supervisors. This area supports at least six known dens of the endangered Kit Fox. Kit Fox can not survive in intensively developed areas. The development is being supported by some as a way to get urban development off of valley agricultural land. But most of the intensive development of this area would be on the relatively flat lands near the freeway and canals south-west of Tracy.



### TASK FORCE MAKES "LAST DITCH" EFFORT TO SAVE ENDANGERED CONDORS

The Condor Task Force includes the U.S. Fish and Wildife Service, the National Audubon Society, the California Department of FIsh & Game, the Los Angeles Zoo, and the San Diego Zoo and Wild Animal Park. Five alumni of the zoology, avian science and veterinary progams at U.C. Davis are among those working on this effort. Stockton Audubon has help by giving part of the monies raised by our "Bird-a-thon" efforts to help with this captive breeding program.

8-28, a Baird's Sandpiper at SSP, 8-29, five Lazuli Bunting, a Blue Grosbeak and 2 Pectoral Sandpiper at DF. 8-30 a Willow Flycatcher, 7 Black-throated Gray Warblers and 15 Wilson's Warbler at OGP, and 30 Forster's Tern at SSP. On 9-5 15 W. Tanager and 14 Burrowing Owls near DF. 9-6 160 Red-necked Phalarope at SSP and I Lesser Nighthawk, a Poorwill and 2 Screech Owl at CH. Also 9-6 there were 2 Lesser Golden Plover at LPS. On 9-13 2 Lesser Yellowlegs and a Sanderling visited the LSP. (Why not "smaller"rather than "lesser" if that is what is meant?) On 9-14 a Hermit Warbler and 2 Lincoln's Sparrow at DF area. On 9-15 20 Warbling Vireo and 2 Chipping Sparrow at CH. 9-21 a Semipalmated Sandpiper at LSP. On 9-22 there were 60 Long-billed Curlew, a Tricolored Blackbird at LSP, v95 Sandhill Crane on Woodbridge Road, & Townsend's Warbler and a Mawrence's Goldfinch at OCP, 9-27 found 2 Fox Sparrow, a Nashville Warbler and 2 Golden-crown Sparrow at CH. Nancy Greenwood observed the return of the White-crowned Sparrows in Stockton on 9-29 and the Golden Crowns returned to her garden on 10-6. On 10-1 there were 2 Hermit Thrush at the Oak Grove. Steve Stocking observed Nutalls Woodpeckers in his trees in Stockton on 10-2. On 10-2 David observed 3 Common Loon, a Common Merganser, 5 Herring Gull and 14 Canada Geese at Lake Commanche. On 10-5 there were 15 Greater Scaup at SSP. On 10-6 Steve observed a Goshawk at Claire Tappaan Lodge near Donner Pass and on 10-7 Steve and Linda observed 20 Evening Grosbeak drinking water in a rain puddle near Lake Tahoe and a Common Merganser swimming in the Lake. On 10-10 Nancy observed 2-male Y.B. Sapsucker in her vard. On 10-12 David observed 45 Canvasback, 3 Redhead, 6 Ring-necked Duck and a Hooded Merganser at SSP. Steve observed a large flock of American Goldfinch feeding on the fruits of his sycamore trees on 10-24 and Nancy observed a large flock (200) of Cattle Egret near Highway 120 and the San Joaquin River on 10-25. On 10-27 Winter Wren and R.B. Nuthatch as well as other small birds were active at Calaveras Big

DEG NEEDS HELP WITH NON GAME SPECIES

Information gathered primarily by the volunteer efforts of many active field ornithologists is used by DFG and other agencies to help in management activities which may keep bird species from becoming endangered. DFG is actively soliciting help on information gathering for future revised editions of their "Bird Species of Special Concern" prepared by J.V. Remsen.

Of the 61 species of special concern the following occur in our area. Detailed information of sightings should be sent to Non-Game Wildlife Department of Fish and Game, 1416 Ninth Street, Sacramento, Ca 95814. Common Loon, Swainson's Hawk, Merlin, Willow Flycatcher, Marsh Hawk, Burrowing Owl, Long-eared Owl, Short-eared Owl, Bank Swallow, Purple Martin, Least Bittern, Sharp-shinned Hawk, Golden Eagle, Prairie Falcon, Sandhill Crane, Black Swift and California Gull.
