September Meeting -Haggin


Our September meeting will start our series of monthly Stockton Audubon meetings to be held at the Haggin Museum, 1201 North Pershing Avenue at 7:30 PM. The program will feature Jim Eastep, wildlife biologist, showing slides and relating the results of his study of the valley's threatened Swainson's Hawks. Ken Nieland, Director of Micke Grove Zoo, will be on hand to display the zoo's captive Swainson's Hawk.

You may wish to come early so that you have time to view the museum's special Audubon chromolithographs exhibit prior to the meeting. Members of the Stockton Audubon board worked with the Haggin Museum and the Stockton Public Library to help select the 33 (from over 100) lithographs to be displayed, choosing those depicting local birds. This rare "volume" Birds of America was purchased by the library in 1894 and is one of the few to remain intact - one of Stockton's jewels.

The county list is a gold color, not to be confused with the yellow Checklist for Birds of Cosumnes River Preserve by John Schick, also available.

August Monterey Trip

The highlight of our Monterey weekend on August 26-27? That's a toughie. We started the trip with a bang as we ventured to Pescadero Marsh on Saturday morning for a Bar-tailed Godwit and found it there among a wide assortment of other shorebirds. Setting sail on the boat on Sunday, one knew it was going to be a heart-stopper as the seas were calm and weather perfect. The elusive Minke Whale was found not 30 minutes into the trip and drew rave reviews but was totally overshadowed b y the 7 or 8 magnificent Blue Whales that were often just a stone's throw away. For some, the spectacular views of 6 Xanto's Murrelets and 2 Tufted Puffins rated extremely high, but could they really compare with the Long-tailed Jaeger that hovered directly over the boat allowing all to see its finer details? At that point the highlight for me was hearing that one corner of the boat's cabin had over 25 empty film boxes piled into it- an indication of a great trip. But that was before the Laysan Albatross flew port side and was chummed in to the back of the boat whereupon the sound of advancing film and motorwinds could be heard above the screaming frenzy of excited nature-lovers. It was a great trip perhaps our best ever. Don't miss the October trip - everyone says then the trips get better.

Nature Guide Available



Stockton Butterfly Count Makes Record

Our annual Stockton Audubon Society field trip/Xerces Society Butterfly Count on June 16, 1989, found a record number of butterfly species — 24 in all — for this event. Among those seen were the elusive Great Purple Hairstreak, the secretive California Sister, and the fast-flying Mourning Cloak. We had fifteen participants this year, also a record number for this event. Though the number of species observed was high, the number of individuals seen was very low, possibly due to the continuing drought and some nearby housing construction.

Land Utilization Alliance

Last fall the board of the Stockton Audubon lociety joined the Land Utilization Alliance (LUA) because we enare concerns for preservation and careful planning. However, the board had expressed concern to LUA for some months at LUA's lack of bylaws and the resulting lack of voice for (Audubon's) habitat concerns. At their June meeting, the board voted to suspend our membership in LUA until LUA had bylaws which we could then evaluate. To date no bylaws have been received.



Ski Lifts Threaten Ridge Route

The Ridge Route (Donner Pass the Squaw Valley) is part of the Pacific Crest Trail. This section begins on the old Highway 40 down from Donner Lake. It is crossed by the old Emigrant Trail close to the point where pioneer wagons crested the Sierra in the mid-1800's. The trail continues along the ridge and eventually wanders down to Squaw Valley.

The Sugarbowl development would like to expand by adding an unknown number of ski lifts which would go right through the Pacific Crest Trail. Trees and other vegetation would be removed and this natural habitat lost. The land for these proposed ski lifts belongs to the National Forest Service: Sugarbowl would like to lease it.

National Forest Service land belongs to all of us and there will be an Environmental Impact Statement available sometime this fall. Most effective if sent soon, letters of concern can be addressed to Joanne Robique, Truckee Ranger Station, P.O.Box 399, Truckee, CA. 95734 (916-587-3558).
